A-Subs Not For Us

OTTAWA (CP)—External Affairs Minister Green said Monday allocation to NATO of U.S. submarines, equipped with Polaris missiles, would not directly affect Canada.

He made the comment after his return early Monday here from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization ministerial conference at Athens by RCAF Comet jet aircraft.

ALTHOUGH PART

Mr. Green told reporters the Polaris - equipped submarines are designated for assignment in European waters and would remain under U.S. control, although part of the NATO force.

He said the four-day meeting went off "very well" with a "good feeling" present among the member nations.

Blast-Seared Distillery

CALGARY (CP)—Reconstruction will start immediately on the Alberta Distillers Ltd. plant in East Calgary which was rocked by an explosion and fire Saturday.

George Relfel, president of Alberta Distillers, said Monday he would not be surprised if damage exceeded \$500,000.

FULLY INSURED

The loss is fully covered by insurance. Rebuilding likely will take four or five months.

The fire and explosion was confined to the distilling units in the main still house. Apart from water damage, the milling, mashing and fermenting units and steam plant are intact, Mr. Relfel said.

SEVERE CONDITION

Frank Vecchio, 33, watchman injured in the blast, still is in serious condition in hospital with burns to most of his body.

Cause of the blast and fire has not been determined.

Sooke Area Search Fails

Sooke RCMP last night were continuing their investigation of a piece of lifejacket found floating off Otter Point during the weekend.

RCAF search and rescue headquarters in Vancouver said last night it had no reports of anyone missing in the area.

It is believed the jacket is of American Navy design and the U.S. Coast Guard has been advised.
